ARTHUR TO RETIRE AS KFB GENERAL COUNSEL

MANHATTAN – Charles S. “Terry” Arthur, General Counsel, will retire from Kansas Farm Bureau on December 30, 2010 after nearly 19 years of employment. Arthur began his career with KFB in July 1992.

In addition to serving as general counsel to the farm organization, Arthur was instrumental in the establishment of the Kansas Farm Bureau Foundation for Agriculture, the Kansas Farm Bureau Legal Foundation and the KFB Political Action Committee (Voters Organized To Elect Farm Bureau Friends - VOTE FBF).

Over the years, Arthur has provided estate planning seminars for county Farm Bureau organizations, written and filed briefs with the Kansas Supreme Court in cases of great importance to agriculture.

“Terry’s been an effective advocate for our members and we will miss his advice and counsel,” said Dan Yunk, Executive Director/CEO of Kansas Farm Bureau.

During his tenure at KFB, Arthur served as legal counsel during the sale of the Kansas Farm Bureau Life Insurance Company and the merger of the Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance companies.

As general counsel, Arthur provided legal and administrative assistance regarding the incorporation, governance and regulatory compliance of Kansas Farm Bureau and served as parliamentarian for the Kansas Farm Bureau Annual Meetings.

Arthur intends to return to his Manhattan-based private law practice, Arthur-Greene.
