

Maintain proper pressure in automobile tires.

Keep doors locked when riding in or driving an automobile.

Keep tools in your automobile for changing tires at all times.

Have a "Police Alert" sign in your automobile for emergency.

Always wear seat belts when operating a vehicle.

Use proper child safety seats when operating a vehicle.

Don't drive in snow or ice unless it's absolutely necessary.

When driving in snow, use proper tires or chains.

When driving in icy conditions, use tire chains.

Don't put infants in the front seat of a car equipped with air bags.

To avoid injury from air bags, put children 12 and under in rear seat.

The safest place for children to ride in an automobile is the back seat.

Only use approved child seats or booster seats in automobiles.

For vehicles with ABS brakes, do not pump the brakes to stop.

Avoid distractions when driving so you can react quickly if needed.

Don't eat lunch or apply makeup while driving an automobile.

Don't shave or apply makeup while driving an automobile.

Stop your automobile to use the cellular phone.

Stop the automobile to find CD's, change, radio stations.

Do not lean over to the passenger seat while operating a vehicle.

Stop the automobile to correct or discipline children.

Pull off to the side of the road to use the cell phone.

Don't drink and drive – the life you save might be your friend's.

Alcohol has negative affects on essential driving skills.

Alcohol interferes with hand-eye coordination.

Alcohol decreases the ability to follow moving objects.

Don't use alcohol and drive, it minimizes peripheral vision.

Alcohol dulls your reaction time and may cause accidents.

Do not start the car until all safety belts are properly fastened.

Shoulder belts should go over the shoulder, not under the arm.

Safety belts are the law – wear them!

To avoid collision with animals, watch for roadside movement.

Always be prepared to stop quickly when driving an automobile.

Remember when driving, animals (especially deer) move in pairs.

When a blowout occurs, grasp the steering wheel and travel straight.

If your vehicle begins to skid, steer in the direction of the skid.

Equip your home with smoke alarms – battery and electric.

Be sure smoke alarms are installed properly.

Test smoke alarms in your home at least once a month.

Replace batteries at least once a year in your home smoke alarm.

Do not use flammable liquids (like gasoline) to start fires.

Keep proper fire extinguishers in your home, shop, and automobile.

Never swim or let children swim alone.

Just because you are a good swimmer, don't swim alone.

Everyone in your family needs to know CPR.

Frozen pipes may burst causing slick steps or electrical shorts.

Know how to shut off water and electricity in your home or shop.

Never use open flames to thaw frozen pipes.

Take care when thawing frozen pipes to avoid electrical shock.

Never leave burning candles unattended.

Keep burning candles out of reach from children and pets.

Only burn a candle in or on a holder.

Keep burning candles away from flammable items.

Let candle and candle holder cool completely before storing.

During lightning, take cover inside a building or rubber-tired vehicle.

Never get under a tree in a lightning storm.

Light the perimeter of your house to avoid accidents and robbery.

Post phone numbers beside phone for police and fire department.

Home address should be clearly visible from street or road.

Report suspicious neighborhood activity to law officers.

Devise a fire escape plan. Practice it with all members of the family.

Each bedroom should have two exits for fire safety.

Have escape ladders if needed for upstairs windows.

Designate a meeting place outside in case of fire.

Practice fire escape plan at least twice a year.

Equip tractors with rollover protective structures.

Wear tractor seat belts when provided.

Set wheels on your tractor as wide as possible to avoid rollover.

Keep the loader bucket as low as possible to avoid rollover.

Never carry a load higher than the tractor drawbar.

Keep tractor brakes locked together when traveling.

Reduce tractor speed when turning, crossing slopes, and slick surfaces.

Never allow extra riders on the tractor or other farm machinery.

Teach your children how to act in natural disasters.

Establish a location for family members to meet in disasters.

Teach family members how to turn off electricity, water and gas.

Conduct periodic family drills to be prepared for emergency.

Prepare an emergency disaster kit for any emergency.

During a tornado or hurricane, go to the lowest level of the building.

During a tornado or hurricane, go to a wall for protection.

If stranded outside in a tornado or hurricane, take cover in a ditch.

Leave immediately when ordered during a tornado or hurricane.

Do not attempt to drive or walk through flooded areas.

To reduce fire damage, install home sprinkler system.

To reduce risk of fire, remove dead limbs and grass near buildings.

Instruct all family members on proper use of fire extinguishers.

Use goggles when using grinding or sharpening tools in farm shop.

Keep household chemicals out of reach of children.

Keep sharp knives and tools out of reach of children.

Keep factory installed guards in place on farm equipment.

Store and transport farm chemicals including fuel in proper containers.

Be sure children are clear when starting or operating machinery.

For child safety, never leave keys in equipment or machinery.

Insure no one is watching without goggles while welding.

Avoid downed power lines. Call the power company.

Stop machinery before making repairs or servicing.

Never go inside a grain bin without a safety rope.

Make sure a ladder is safe and in a safe position before climbing.

For child safety, keep doors to tool rooms and shops locked.

Use fire department codes on outside of chemical storage.
