All children age four and younger must be in a federally-approved child safety seat.

Children age four but under 14 years of age must be protected by a safety belt. It's the law.

The safest place for any child is in the back seat.

If a child must ride in the front seat, be sure to move the seat as far back as possible.

Who's ready for a booster seat?

- Any child who is less than 8 years old and less than 4'9" tall.
- Any child who cannot sit with his or her back straight against the vehicle seat back cushion or who cannot sit with knees bent over a vehicle's seat edge without slouching.
- For maximum protection, keep your child in a forward-facing child safety seat with full harness as long as the child fits in the seat.

Who's ready for lap and shoulder belts?

- Any child who no longer fits comfortably in a convertible safety seat and is large enough for the belt to fit correctly—at least 4'9" tall.
- The lap belt fits low and snug on your child's hips and the shoulder belt lies across your child's chest and over the shoulder.
- The shoulder belt does not cross your child's face or neck. To protect your child's head and neck, never place the shoulder belt under the arm or behind the back.
- Your child should be able to sit with his or her back straight against the vehicle back seat cushion or sit with knees bent over the vehicle's seat edge without slouching.
