How the Kansas Legislature Works

Meets Every Year: Kansas has a "citizen" legislature in that it does not meet full time; interim study

committees hold extensive hearings between sessions.

Sessions: Begin the second Monday in January; bulk of session is generally completed by

the first part of April; after a 10-20 day recess, they return for a "wrap-up" session to consider any remaining business. They return at the end of May or first of June for "sine die" (no future date set for resumption) adjournment.

Members: There are 125 members in the Kansas House of Representatives and 40

members in the Senate. House members are elected for 2-year terms, and

Senate members for 4-year terms.

Leadership: The leader and presiding officer in the House is the Speaker and in the Senate

the President. Both are traditionally elected the first day of the session following a general election. However, they are actually nominated by the majority party at a caucus prior to the legislative session. The Majority Leader

and Minority Leader in both houses are also powerful figures.

Committees: Most of the work is done through committees. In 2007 there are 18 standing

committees in the Senate and 16 Joint Committees of the Senate and House. As committees have a life and death hold on the bills assigned to them, the chairpersons of the most important committees have great power. NOT ALL COMMITTEES ARE OF EQUAL IMPORTANCE; THIS VARIES FROM YEAR TO

YEAR!

Staff: The Kansas Legislature has ample staff support. They Include:

* Clerk of the House and Secretary of the Senate (handle all bills

and documents and keep accurate records of all activities),

* Administrative Assistants (eyes and ears of the leadership),

* Division of Legislative Administrative Services (central contact

point for the public),

* Legislative Research Department, Revisor of Statutes Office.

* Division of Legislative Post Audit (oversees financial audits and

conducts performance audits of state agencies).
