(230-250 pounds)</p>	<p>Pigs are hauled to market to be sold in a semi or a trailer.</p>	<p>Pigs arrive at a facility to be processed, inspected, cut and sold to a wholesaler.</p>	<p>All meat is cut into smaller pieces and packaged to be sold.</p>
 <p>Chickens</p>	<p>Chickens hatch from their egg after 21 days of being in an incubator.</p>	<p>Young chickens (chicks) are sent to the grower after 1-2 days.</p>	<p>Chickens are ready for market when they are 8 weeks old. (4-5 pounds)</p>	<p>Chickens are hauled to market to be sold in a semi or a trailer.</p>	<p>Chickens arrive at a facility to be processed, defeathered, inspected and chilled.</p>	<p>At the wholesaler, meat is cut into smaller pieces and packaged to be sold.</p>
 <p>Dairy Cattle</p>	<p>Calves are born after 9 months of gestation. (Normally, a cow has one calf per year)</p>	<p>Female cows can have their first calf when they are 2 years old.</p>	<p>Cows can produce milk after their first calf. Some cows give as much as 8 gallons of milk per day.</p>	<p>Milk is cooled, and pumped into a truck to be shipped to a dairy plant.</p>	<p>Milk is tested, pasteurized, and homogenized. Milk is shipped directly to the store from here.</p>	<p>The milk not sent to the store, goes to a wholesaler to be processed into other dairy products.</p>
 <p>Sheep</p>	<p>Lambs are born after 5 months of gestation. (Normally, a ewe has 1-2 lambs at a time)</p>	<p>Lambs are sold to a feeder-finisher after 3-4 months. (50-70 pounds)</p>	<p>Lambs are ready for market when they are 8-9 months old. (110-130 pounds)</p>	<p>Lambs are hauled to market in a semi or a trailer to be sold.</p>	<p>Lambs arrive at a facility to be processed, inspected, cut and sold to a wholesaler.</p>	<p>All meat is cut into smaller pieces and packaged to be sold.</p>

 <p>Beef Cattle</p>	<p>Beef cattle produce around 450 pounds of meat. Examples include: chuck roasts, ribs, sirloin steak, and hamburger.</p>    	<p>Other products produced from beef cattle include: Hide: Leather used in shoes, belts, gloves, etc. Fats: Animal feeds, plastics, and many chemicals. Blood & Meat Scraps: Animal feed, and buttons. Organs and Glands: Pharmaceuticals.</p>  
 <p>Pigs</p>	<p>Pigs produce around 120 pounds of meat. Examples include: pork chops, pork roast, sausage, ham, and bacon.</p>    	<p>Other products produced from pigs include: Hide: Leather used in shoes, belts, gloves, etc. Fats: Animal feeds, plastics, and many chemicals. Blood & Meat Scraps: Animal feed, and buttons. Organs and Glands: Pharmaceuticals.</p> 
 <p>Chickens</p>	<p>Chickens produce around 2 pounds of meat. Examples include: breasts, drumsticks, and wings. They also produce eggs.</p>    	<p>Other products produced from chickens include: Deboned Meat: Hot dogs, bologna. Feathers: Poultry feed, pillows. Scraps: Pet food.</p> 
 <p>Dairy Cattle</p>	<p>Dairy cattle produce milk. Milk can be consumed fresh, whole, skim, 2%, condensed, evaporated, powdered, or as cream.</p>   	<p>Other products produced from dairy cattle include: Butter, cheese, yogurt, ice cream, buttermilk, prepared foods, glue, and pharmaceuticals.</p>   
 <p>Sheep</p>	<p>Sheep produce around 50 pounds of meat. Examples include: lamb chops, and mutton roast.</p>   	<p>Other products produced from sheep include: 8-10 pounds of fleece per shearing: Clothes, upholstery, materials, fabrics and textiles. Meat Scraps: Pet food. Hide: Fine leather.</p>
